A Message from Nurse Reagan

Hello LCS Community!

Happy Spring??!!!

Recently the CDC has updated their isolation guidelines for Covid-19. Here are some recommendations on core prevention steps and strategies:

*Students and staff should stay home and away from others until they have been fever free for 24 hours, without the use of fever reducing medications, and their symptoms are improving.

*Practice hand hygiene.

*Use respiratory etiquette by covering your mouth and nose when you cough and sneeze.

*Stay up to date on vaccinations and physicals.

*Masks are optional but encouraged with symptomatic students unable to practice respiratory etiquette.

*Breathe in cleaner air with increased ventilation: purify indoor air and/or have outdoor gatherings.

Speaking of getting outside, **a total solar eclipse will occur on April 8**. A big shout out to Mrs.Burns and Partners for Enrichment for providing our staff and students with eclipse glasses, which will be passed out in the week to come. Whether you are making the trek north or staying home to catch a glimpse, here are some safety tips for protecting your eyes:

*The only safe way to look at the eclipse is through eclipse glasses or filters. Sunglasses do not protect your eyes from the increased sunlight. Inspect all glasses and filters for tears, punctures or breaks in integrity.

*Assist your student while donning the glasses, and do not leave the student unattended.

*If your student wears glasses, put them on first and the eclipse glasses or viewer over the glasses.

*Cover your eyes with the glasses before looking up at the sun, and turn away from the sun before taking off the glasses.

*Do not look at the eclipse through an unfiltered device such as a camera, telescope, binoculars, or any optical device.








PRE K, Tasha Kordek

Partners for Enrichment is bringing in artist Antje Roitsch for an art project for 3rd-5th grades at LCS.




4th Grade Learning Celebrations, Emily Egeland

Everyone had something to celebrate, including finishing chapter books, learning to do multi-digit multiplication, and successfully researching different topics.








Fifth Grade, James Blackman

Snapchat Uncovered - Teens Discuss Pitfalls of this Popular App

Snapchat, the platform most widely used by teens to communicate with each other, is ever-evolving and constantly adopting new features to make it more enticing. Did you know they now have a whole section like TikTok called Spotlight? Have you heard about Snap Scores and how it can fuel feelings of unpopularity? Did you know that teens are getting fed all sorts of sexual content, including ads for Only Fans? (What is Only Fans? – Wikipedia)

I knew it was time to delve deeper into the app, and what better way than to invite two emerging adults onto <u>The Screenagers Podcast</u> who had things they wanted to share? The idea for the episode came from one of them, a high school boy I call "Jake" because he had reached out to me for advice. In our conversation, he mentioned how he wished parents would know things about Snapchat that he felt probably many did not know.

I love this important Screenagers Podcast episode, which just dropped yesterday. It is only 16 minutes long, and we hope you will listen — and subscribe to our show (it's free!). In the meantime,

I am sharing some highlights here, including practical parenting tips at the end.

Let me start with something that Jake says in the episode, "I don't want to speak for other teenagers," he says, "but I don't think they're going to go and tell their parents, 'Oh yeah, look at this app, look how dangerous it is, all this bad content."

Frequent Sexual Content

Snapchat was founded in 2011 by two Stanford undergraduates who wanted a way to send risque pictures that would be deleted after sending and receiving them. Today, friends connect on Snap with silly selfies or location shots, which are often pretty benign. What is concerning is that Snapchat's immediate deletion of content continues to make it a source of risque content and a ripe environment for drug dealers, as I talk about in my latest movie, "<u>Screenagers Under the Influence:</u> <u>Addressing Vaping, Drugs, and Alcohol in the Digital Age.</u>"

"There's a lot of inappropriate content exposure. Any influencer or whatnot can post something that's revealing. It'll just go up on your stories list because Snapchat is going to push out popular stories to all audiences. So it just might end up on a new user's suggested content," Jake tells me.

Snap Scores - What is it, and how it can negatively impact on youth

Streaks have been around for a long time – but something less known is Snap Scores.

"Your account has something called a Snap Score," Jake says. "And basically, you want a higher score, and you do that by sending the most snaps and engaging with the app the most. So, people just send random pictures of anything to other people, and then their Snap Score increases. It keeps you connected with certain people."

Here is a bit of the conversation that Jake and I had about the ways this can make someone feel unpopular:

Jake: "Like, if yours is low, then that might send the message of more of a quiet person with a closer friend group or something."

Me: "You're being very judicious. It could make it seem like you're not very popular."

Jake: "It could. You didn't hear it from me, but, uh, also, like my friend who has his in the millions, he has probably double the amount of friends that I have. And he probably snaps double the amount of people. I think a lot of teens feel like they have to have, like, a high snap score because it looks better."

Thus, ultimately, this feature can encourage young people to use Snapchat more and send snaps to raise their scores.

Only Fans

Snapchat has evolved to include a section called Spotlight and Discover, where users can see rotating videos from Influencers, similar to Instagram and TikTok, in addition to conversations with disappearing messages.

A girl in college, Dev, who also shares important things in the episode, tells me that she receives a lot of ads for OnlyFans and other illicit content in her feed. OnlyFans is a site and an app that offers inherently sexual content for a fee. "I think my Discover and things that are pushed to me are very either overdramatized and incorrect or oddly sexual," she says. "It's weird because I'm not even subscribed to them, but they show up on my Discover," she says.

Parenting tips

- Kids are influenced by older kids; this is a fact. Share this episode of The Screenagers
 Podcast with your kids so they can hear Jake and Dev discuss their concerns. This will be a
 wonderful way to discuss these topics from a third perspective.
- 2. Here is a quote from the show that will also serve in a similar third perspective. Dev, the girl in college, told me, "I also am a strong believer that Snapchat ... was made to send nudes. So, I think it still has that sexual nature, and people don't really realize that anymore. If I had a little sibling, I would put them away from Snapchat at least for a while because it is highly sexual, I would say."
- 3. Discuss that Snapchat does not make it possible for parents and teens to take away certain features. In the show, I say the following:

"... this app makes it impossible to disable different features. In other words, to be able to customize things. For example, to get rid of Discover and or Spotlight. If a parent and teen discussed this and thought that would be the best move, they really don't make that possible."

- 4. Remember that as a parent, you can <u>reverse course</u> and let your child know that you have changed your mind about their having Snapchat at the current time for the following reasons. This is something to consider, particularly if your child is in middle school or younger. You can talk about texting as an alternative. Or you can at least decide to decrease their time on Snapchat.
- 5. Work as a vulnerable village. Let parents of your kids know that you have new concerns about Snapchat and that you want to set up a time to all talk. You can forward this blog

and the Podcast to them and then set up a time to all talk. From there, you could decide as a group to have your kids no longer use Snapchat for the time being.

Questions to get the conversation started within your family or group:

- What do you like about Snapchat? What don't you like about it?
- What are your thoughts about Snap Scores?
- What do you all think about the quotes from emerging adults in this blog post?
- Did you know the history of how Snapchat started?
- Should Snapchat make its platform customizable so things like the Discovery page can be disabled?
